WHEREAS, Rhode Island General Laws, including but not limited to, Title 30, Chapter 15 allows the Governor to enact, extend and/or terminate executive orders relating to disaster emergencies; and

- WHEREAS, the Governor issued Executive Order # 21-103 which extended existing Executive Orders #21-86 (as to the declaration of emergency for new COVID 19 variants); and, #21-87 (as to requiring masks in school), to remain in full force and effect until November 13, 2021; and
- WHEREAS, Rhode Island General Laws Title 30, Chapter 15, Section 9(b) allows the General Assembly to terminate, by concurrent resolution, a state of disaster emergency order; and

- **WHEREAS,** the people of Rhode Island have been provided with sufficient information from multiple channels and multiple levels of government since March of 2020 with respect to the COVID -19 virus and related variants; and
- **WHEREAS**, the people of Rhode Island have overwhelmingly responded to the call of Federal and State officials to receive a COVID -19 vaccine;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town of Glocester calls on the Governor to indicate specific metrics at which point there will be no need to extend further the additional emergency declarations; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Town of Glocester calls on the General Assembly to reconvene before the end of November, 2021, to take responsibility for their constitutional and statutory authority, as is their duty, given their oath of office, to the people of the State of Rhode Island and to examine the need for such or any emergency extensions.

I am requesting consent from the Glocester Town Council to create and pilot a three year K-9 Program within the Glocester Police. I would like to apply \$20,000 in Federal Asset Forfeiture Funds to cover the majority of the expenses over this three year period.

The expenses would include the following:

^{*}The purchase of a fully trained K-9 Labrador in narcotics and tracking \$7,000

*Medical expenses to include regular veterinarian visits and supplies

The Warwick Police will be donating a \$3,000 value K-9 police cruiser kennel to the Glocester Police. The kennel is compatible with a current Glocester Police front line vehicle and will be installed as soon as possible.

The police department training budget and special patrol line-item budget may be used for additional training and call outs when needed. I will discuss these issues with the Budget Board when planning for the FY-2022/2023 budget year.

The implementation of a K-9 program will enhance the already excellent police community relations with the public and citizens of Glocester. The K-9 will further be readily available for tracking missing persons/juveniles and narcotics investigations as they arise.

As a result of those interviews and favorable reference checks, we are recommending the appointment of Michelle Mariani of Woonsocket to the position of Clerk I in the Assessor's Office effective November 15, 2021, pending successful completion of a criminal background check and documentation of her eligibility to work in the United States. Ms. Mariani has prior experience in the Tax Assessor's Office in North Smithfield as well as in Woonsocket.

In this role, Ms. Mariani will earn \$22.59 per hour in the Clerk I classification and will be part of the LUINA clerical bargaining unit. (End of memo)

E. Authorization: Application for Grant: Rhode Island Commerce - Site Readiness Program - Discussion and/or Action

Councilor Forgue stated that Karen Scott, Town Planner, has submitted the following request which Councilor Arnold read as follows:

Date: October 28, 2021

Re: Rhode Island Commerce- Site Readiness Program

In December 2020, the Town completed the Chepachet Village Revitalization Plan.

This planning process built on all previous planning efforts and developed a targeted revitalization plan for the Village to create a five-year implementation and investment plan.

One of major obstacles identified to business expansion and development in general in the Plan is the lack of public water and sewer infrastructure. Engineering and installing individual private wells and wastewater treatment systems on an individual parcel basis is often cost prohibitive for small business expansion or for new businesses to locate in the Village. Reuse of underutilized spaces, such as second floors, can also be hindered by water and septic requirements, including for housing. The recommendations in the Plan include exploring opportunities for package and shared wastewater systems as well as shared public wells and to educate property owners of different possibilities available and opportunities to join with neighboring property owners who are also looking to upgrade existing water wells and wastewater systems.

Commerce Rhode Island has recently introduced a Site Readiness Program. The program is focused on providing financial assistance to support initiatives that will catalyze economic growth and development, including site specific planning and predevelopment activities. The proposals can include property surveys, master planning, engineering surveys and environmental studies.

I am seeking approval to apply for a site readiness grant for \$125,000 for engineering related to drinking water wells and wastewater systems. I would like to work with the Economic Development Commission to identify properties with these types of infrastructure challenges and work with interested property owners to look for and engineer package or shared systems that would enable existing business retention and expansion and new business development. (End of memo)

Discussion: Councilor Steere stated that the grant focus is on business and inquired as to the benefit to the residents who live in town. K. Scott stated that the focus is business but that due to the nature of the area, where residents and businesses live in such close proximity on such small lots, that both businesses and residences would be improved. Councilor Steere wants to make sure that the town is making good use of the money and if there will be any money left to spread around and complete. K. Scott stated that the priority is on the engineering to determine what would need to be done but that any information received would not go stale. K. Scott stated that she would be asking for volunteers to participate.

F. American Rescue Act Funds: Determine selection and prioritization process - Discussion and/or Action

Back in September, staff provided the Town Council with an overview of the American Rescue Act, the amount of funds the Town is expected to receive (\$2,545,368.48), the objectives for funding, allowable uses of the funds and a timeline for project completion. As part of the allocation of these funds to specific projects, local governments were urged to engage their constituents and communities in developing plans to use these payments. To that end, we posted survey on the homepage of the Town's website as a way to gather public input and an ad was placed in the Bargain Buyer to publicize the survey. The survey went live on September 20, 2021 and was closed on October 15, 2021. Attached please find a summary of the survey results.

Additionally, staff has been collaborating on a list of potential projects with cost estimates that meet the funding objectives and eligibility criteria. I have attached that list for Town Council consideration.

I am requesting that the Town Council have a discussion on how they would like to select and prioritize projects so that staff may begin the planning and implementation of projects using the American Rescue Plan funds. (End of memo)

Discussion: Councilor Arnold commented on the number of people who participated in the surveys and asked how the council might prioritize the suggestions. K. Scott stated that there were various ways to prioritize including the Council forming a subcommittee, or staff. Councilor Forgue asked K. Scott's opinion as to the usefulness of a subcommittee. K Scott stated that she would be happy to prescreen projects with a subcommittee and report back to the Council. J. Fecteau stated that the department heads have already acted as a so called "subcommittee" and had items that they would recommend because the departments haven't been able to budget for the expenses. Councilor Arnold stated his opinion that the requests from the department heads were practical and suggested starting with those requests. Councilor Forgue stated his preference for a subcommittee to prioritize the entire list and bring back to the Council. Councilor Steere stated that he has no problem with a subcommittee but that he feels the department heads know what is needed. Councilor Steere stated that the items requested by the department heads are practical and not frivolous. J. Fecteau suggested the Council could look at the department head list and determine a plan. Councilor Arnold suggested making each department head request a separate item on an upcoming agenda for the Council to discuss and decide on an action. J. Fecteau suggested that the department's Council liaison could reach out to the department head and discuss. J. Fecteau added that the Council liaison could then contact the clerk to request the item be placed on the agenda. K. Scott stated that she could separate the requests into the different departments and send the list to the appropriate liaison. Councilor Reichert brought up the question/ possibility of the center of town in Glocester connecting to the Burrillville water system. There was discussion on the use of a RI Commerce grant being used to determine the feasibility of utilities in the village district.

Obtaining an appraisal would require an RFP as I suspect that an appraisal of this nature, given the complexity and specific use of the FM Global facility, will exceed \$5,000.

With the Council's permission I will prepare the bid documents and post the RFP in accordance with State and Town purchasing policy.

An appraisal of the FM Global facility on Reynolds Road will serve the Town should a discussion commence with FM Global on a subsequent PILOT or Tax Stabilization agreement or if an agreement is not reached this information will be instrumental to the Tax Assessor in assigning a value to the FM Global property in order to generate a tax bill.
